The Administration of Maharaja Bhoj Govt. 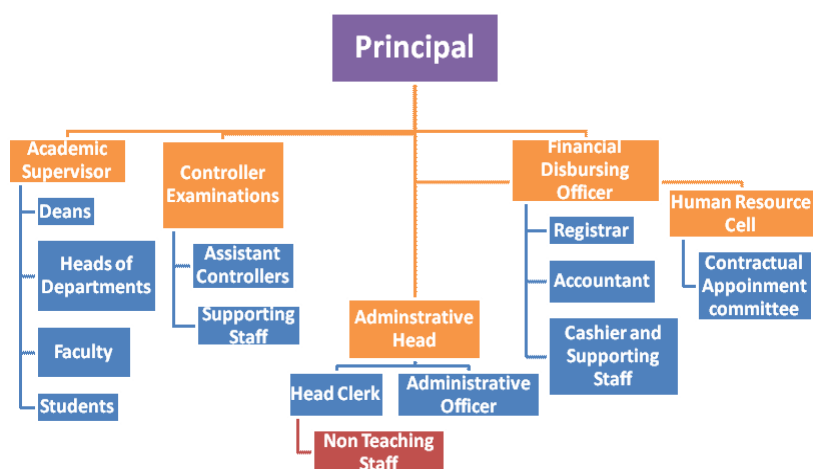

.Energy conservation:

Our buildings and classrooms have natural light and ventilation so electricity is used only during extreme conditions. Compact fluorescent lamps (CFL) are used instead of 40/60 watts incandescent bulbs. Now the college is switching from CFL to LED technology to save energy. All lights are switched off immediately when not required. Computers, printers and electronic instruments which are not in use are closed down. To avoid the wastage of electrical energy, it is ensured that fans are put off in the unoccupied classrooms or laboratories. The message "SAVE POWER, SAVE WATER" is publicized widely to create awareness and sense of responsibility through rallies, and notices. From the year 2011 all computers purchased are LCD monitors to reduce the usage of electricity. It also helps in conservation of electricity.
