Part I

1. **The Principal's Report (2 pages)-** Highlights the key activities, events, and successes of the past year and briefly describes major new initiatives to be undertaken over the next year.

Highlights

1. Regular Principal Dr. K.S. Sengar, an experienced administrator, took charge in the month of December, 2017.
2. Preparations for NAAC Peer team visit during forthcoming months was full on swing.
3. Some students participated in sports at Inter university level and National Level.
4. Academically it was a sound session. Many teachers attended National Seminar and Conferences and presented papers. More than 10 Ph.D. degrees were awarded under the supervision of teachers.
5. District level Kabaddi competition was hosted by college and Divisional level was assisted.
6. Our Football team was winner at District Champion and Runner at Volleyball.

7. About 10 sessions for career guidance were organised by the students. This was other than 2 short term career training programmes of 21-24 days duration each (covering about 36-40 hrs training each). This was under Swami Vivekanand Career Guidance Scheme..
8. Though they could not get finally selected , our students participated in T.C.S.Open Campus recruitment.
9. Two camps of Entrepreneurship development were organised by the Entrepreneurship Development Cell of College. Experts were invited for this purpose and also Industrial visits were provided to participants.
10. Many Professors attended National level Seminars/ Conferences and presented research papers.
11. 720 students of SC/ST/OBC Classes received scholarship a.
12. Under the scheme “Book Bank” a total of 361 students (SC and ST) were given books and stationery amounting Rs.212338/= (Rs.Two lakh twelve thousand three hundred thirty eight).
13. Students were benefitted through out the session by accessing various competitive magazines and employment newspapers available in the Swami Vivekanand Career Guidance Cell.
14. Issuance and returning of books to/from students was assured by the Librarian and Librarian.
15. Some of our teachers served during 2016-17 as Chairman/members of Board of Studies in different subjects in Jiwaji University,Gwalior. Dept of Higher Education appointed Two teachers in Central Board of Studies in Economics and Sociology for framing syllabus for Undergraduate Classes.
16. 06 teachers got their research papers published in Reputed and recognised journals.
17. 11 research scholars got Doctorate Degree (Ph.D.) under the able guidance of Research Supervisors of this college.
18. 2 teachers attended a 15 days programme on Entrepreneurship Development.
19. 10 sessions were organised by Personality Development Cell during 2015-16. Topics covered a variety of topics related with grooming.
20. National Service Scheme (N.S.S.) Unit organised various programmes on greenery, plantation, AIDS, harmony in community, girl child education, voting awareness ,importance of education etc. Also a 10 days camp was organised by this unit under the guidance of N.S.S. Officer.

College Chale Abhiyan - The schools of city and nearby villages were informed through pamphlets. Meetings with principals of schools were held in the month of June about the online admission process and the various scheme of Department of Higher Education. Resultantly the admission strength is increased to sufficient level during current session. Campaign wa lead by Dr.Vandana Chaturvedi, Senior Professor.

Library-The automation of our library is in process. Computer with internet Wi-Fi facility is established in the library. The College is subscribed to INFLIBNET enabling support to learning, research and academic pursuits. E –library to be set

- * College was started in the year 1970 in the name of Late Shri Shyamlal Pandaviya, a veteran freedom fighter and leader.
- * It was then started from a govt school building, Morar, Gwalior. Science Department was inaugurated by Late Sh. Narsingh Rao Dixit, the then Home Minister, State Govt. of Madhya Pradesh.
- * It was shifted to a new building with vast area of more than 8 acre. All the three faculties of Arts, Science and Commerce were in the college.
- * Earlier L.L.B Course was also run by the college, but from 1998 the posts were transferred to Govt. M.L.B. College, Gwalior. From then L.L.B. Course is not operational.
- * It was accredited by NAAC in 2009 with A Grade and again in 2017 by B+ Grade.
- * NAAC inspection (I Cycle) was made in October 2008 and Grade B was accorded.
- * PGDCA course was started in 2015-16 on self finance basis.
- * Preparations are on for 2nd round of NAAC.

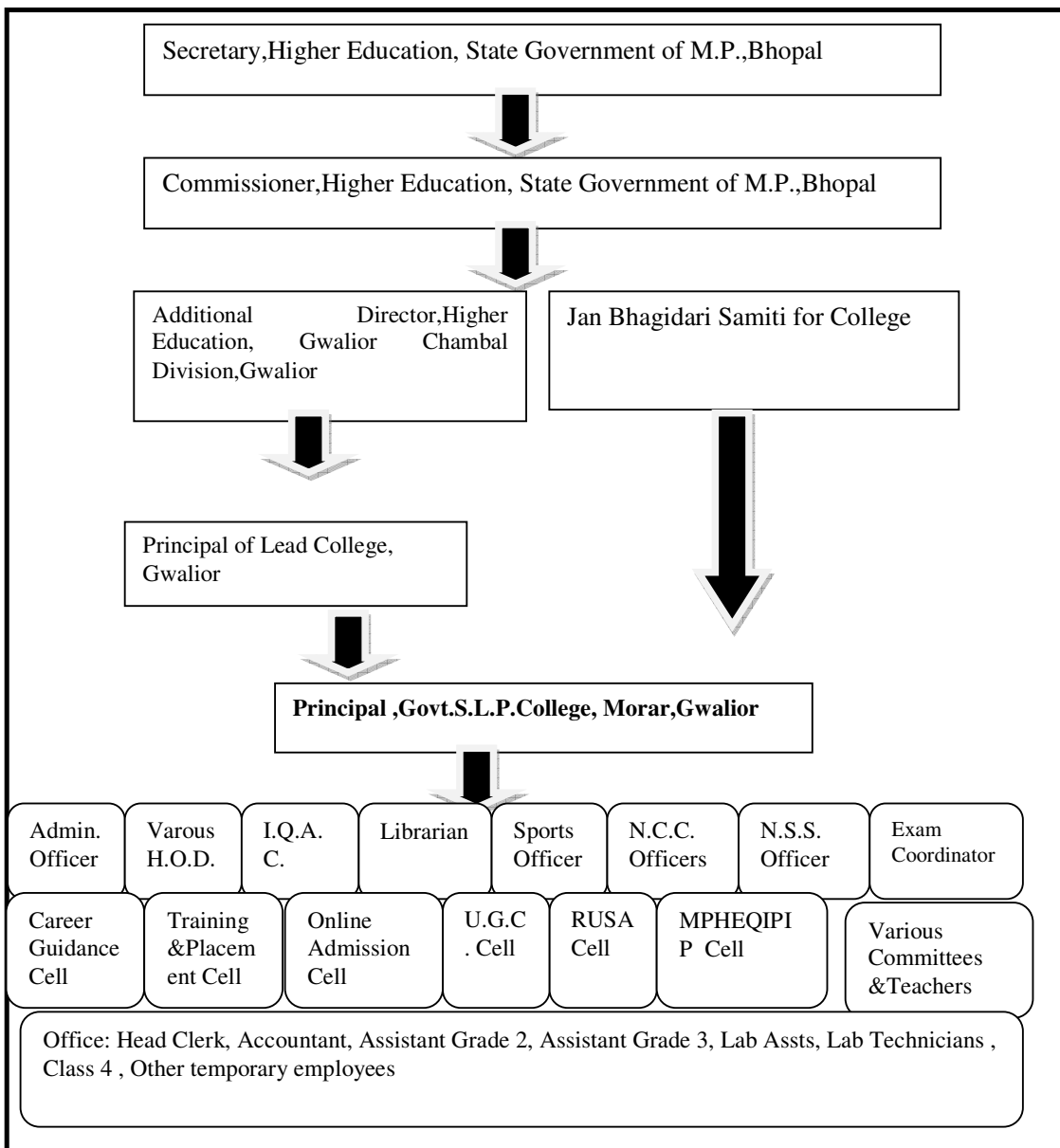

- **Library as a learning resource- advisory committee, its composition, facilities & services (e & print), annual improvement initiatives**

College has a Central Library. It has 44872 books. 5 magazines are 5 journals are subscribed by it. Book Bank scheme is run under Library. Full time librarian and a book lifter is posted here. Purchase and Development Committee ,comprising of 4 Senior Professors , looks after the related matters. Under the scheme 'Book Bank' a total 361 SC/ST students got benefit of having books/stationery of Rs.1500/= during 2015-16. Every Saturday 'PRASHNMANCH' (Quiz) was organised for students by Librarian. Every day a Quotation is written by Librarian on Display Board to motivate the students. Automation work of library was carried out in library. This is continued in present session as well.. Book Reading Club(comprising of good students) was also active throughout 2015-16. Soul 2.0 Software and INFLIBNET is used for library. We expect, more books and journals, more magazines subscription during 2016-17. However due to space constrain and increasing number of students, we have planned to demand for Barcode facility and expansion of library building. More books, magazines and journals are needed.

Cent percent fee collection for admissions, exam forwarding fee, T.C./C.C. etc is online. A Computer learning programme 'Spoken Tutorials' is being run with the help of IIT,Mumbai. 117 students were registered for it during current session.. PGDCA Course is run by the college. B.Sc.(Computer Science) and B.Com (Computer Science) courses are also run. Smart Classes are used to get them learn better with the help of ICT .

The subject of training was 'Preparation for Open competitive examinations' These were in addition to monthly guidance programmes which covered C.V./Resume, Group Discussion, Placement process etc.
02. 10 sessions were organised by Personality Development Cell during 2015-16. Experts covered a variety of topics related with grooming.
03. National Service Scheme (N.S.S.) Unit organised various programmes on greenery, plantation, AIDS, harmony in community, girl child education, voting awareness ,importance of education etc. Also a 10 days camp was organised by this unit under the guidance of N.S.S. Officer Dr.A.K.Singh
04. Some of our NCC(Naval Wing) attended camp of R.D.C and N.S.C. IN 2015-16.06 Cadets were selected for Naval Camp and one Naval Cadet was selected for RDC. 18 Naval Cadets passed B and 13 passed for C-Certificate of NCC.
05. Entrepreneurship Development Cell of College organised camps of 3 days duration each .These covered guidance from industrialists ,businessmen, bankers, Distt Industry Centre, MSME, .Industrial visits were in addition to these activities.
06. Automation work continued in library.
07. Book Bank Scheme helped the students.361 SC/ST students received book and stationery of Rs.1500/= each. Thorough verification of library was made by verification committee.
08. Though mentoring system is not followed in the college, special classes were taken to help weaker students. For slow learners and visually handicapped students concerned subject teachers took extra efforts. In every examination where Visually handicapped students appeared, extra invigilators were provided for their extra room or space. During inter examinations also they were given special attention.

Sports activities, Cultural and literacy festivals and activities were organised time to time as per the calendar declared by Dept of Higher Education, State Government of Madhya Pradesh. Achievements are shown under main heading 8.

✓ **Major student welfare initiatives over the past year**

1. Help Desk worked throughout the admission process for U.G./P.G.I Semester almost for 4 months. More than 3000 forms of admission seekers for various colleges of Madhya Pradesh were verified. During admission process it was ensured to minimise the problems of students in the process.
2. Dissemination of all important information was made easily available by displaying these at all important points.
3. Verification of scholarship forms of SC/ST/OBC was taken care of timely during 2015-16. A total of 720 students received scholarship(SC-289,ST-02,OBC-433).
4. Different welfare schemes of State Government e.g. Gaon ki Beti, Vikramaditya Yojana were implemented.
5. All eligible students received scholarship.
6. Anti Ragging Committee was active throughout the session of 2015-16.
7. Safe drinking water was ensured. During summers sand made pots were made available in addition to water coolers.
8. Facility of reading room and career library was strengthened.
9. Examination committee took care of the examination related issues of students (for private students also).
10. Though mentoring system is not followed in the college, special classes were taken to help weaker students. For slow learners and visually handicapped students concerned subject teachers took extra efforts. In every examination where Visually handicapped students appeared, extra invigilators were provided for their extra room or space. During internal examinations also they were given special attention
