Government Nehru P.G. College Deori, Sagar was founded in 1973. The College grew out of the efforts of Dr. Dwarka Prasad Katore who believed in and promoted education for the local people in the field of attaining higher education. Its glorious history and living tradition is the backbone of the College. The vision of the College intensified over the decades, remains focused on the holistic development and empowerment of women. The College not only prepares students for industry and employment, but also to contribute to the corpus of thought and knowledge, to contemplate the life of the mind, without which evolution is not possible. Though classes are held in shift because of the lack of lecture rooms, the College provides academic and infrastructural support to these.

From Private college it is taken over by the govt. under M.P. Higher Education founded in the year 1964. The college has its own land of 8 acres with play ground and garden on the N.H. 26. Deori as the name suggest is a historical place of temples called popularly as Dev Nagri. There is increase in the no. of students admitted in the college since then. There are three faculties-B.A., BSc, B.Com in under graduation and PG in Hindi, Geography, Economics, Mathematics & Commerce. The self financing course of Computer Application is introduced.

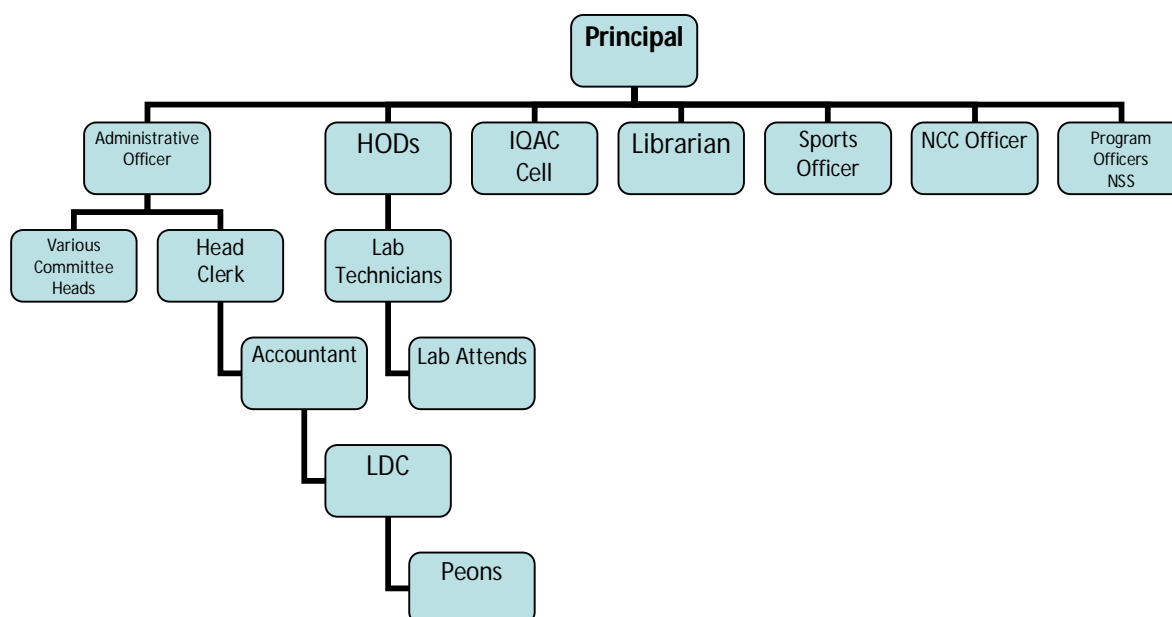
