- The college has always encouraged the tribal culture wick is sticked to the area.

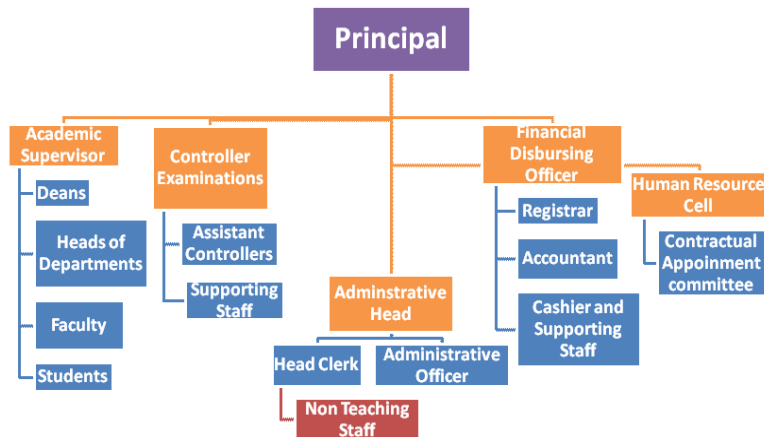
