Govt P. G. College, Guna was established in 1957 as an undergraduate college. At that time the college was affiliated to Vikram University, Ujjain. At present It is affiliated to Jiwaji University, Gwalior and recognized by UGC under 2f and 12b. It is providing education in undergraduate and postgraduate classes in arts, science and commerce disciplines. It is the lead college of the district to coordinate with all the govt. colleges of the district. The college runs some academic programmes which are self finance and managed by the Janbhagidari Samitt of the college which plays an important role in the all round development of the college. The college has three NSS units (two for boys and one for girls) and one NCC unit. The NCC and NSS units of the college conducted different activities all around the year as per the MP Govt. calendar. Some NCC cadets of the college have attended in RDC parade in New Delhi. All the three NSS units of the college were highly active past year and conducted so many programs related to social service. Swami Vivekanand Career Counselling Cell is also very much active to provide the information to the students regarding job opportunities and conducted a job fair also with the help of local administration and district employment centre. As far as games and sports are concerned, the student of the college participated in different games at the college, university, state and national levels. The Botany department of the college organized a seminar on Biodiversity on 30.09.2016. A lot of literary and cultural activities were also held during the year. Youth festival was also organised in the college in which the students participated in different activities very actively and were selected for university and state level youth festival.

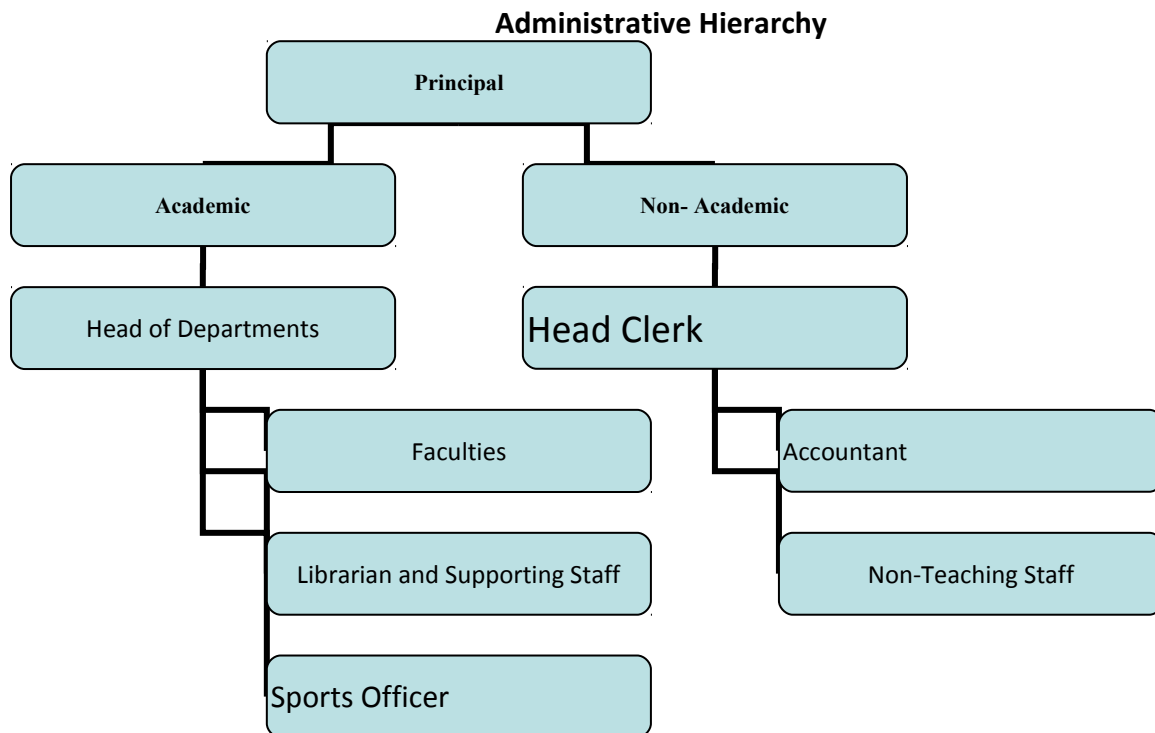
